What Would Ignatius Have Done?!!

The Jesuits are celebrating the 500th Year of the Cannonball Moment in the life of Ignatius, which transformed him and set him on his mission - and this turned out to be very fruitful for the establishment of God's Kingdom. So what would Ignatius have done if he had entered in the 21st Century? Well, Ignatius of Loyola perhaps would have joined the Franciscans!!!

See the evidence: a very prominent Jesuit Cardinal took on the mission and vision of Francis of Assisi – he even took on the name "Francis" and the Church calls him Pope Francis! "Laudato Si" takes up a lot of the cultural priorities of St. Francis and "Fratelli Tutti" also cites his example. So a Jesuit Pope, with Ignatian discernment, takes up the agenda of the Franciscans. That's how the Spirit works!

Pope Francis gives us indications of what Ignatius would have done had he been in our times. Firstly he would have wanted to reform the Church, as the Pope's intention for this month clearly states; and this would mean breaking down clericalism, empowering the lay vocation, giving women their rightful place in the Church, viewing people of other Churches and other Religions as also having authentic experiences of God—in short, implementing Vatican II.

Secondly Ignatius would have worked to **change public policy**, in order to bring about a more equitable economic system - we know that Ignatius gave importance to people of influence in his days. Doing

works of charity to alleviate the sufferings of the victims of an unjust economic order is not sufficient as a strategy to help the poor.

Thirdly, Ignatius would have worked to restore our Common Home - the Planet, through changes in spirituality, values, lifestyle and technology.

The fourth task would be to bring about a **change of attitude to refugees** and migrants, so that they would be met with hospitality and compassion. Bringing peace in the midst of conflict situations through reconciliation is also a part of this agenda.

Finally Ignatius would have found ways to **connect** young people with God, a connection which seems weak at the moment, with the youth not finding Church relevant to their needs and culture. Of course, it's quite possible that they are finding God outside the Church!

And who is Ignatius today?
Each one of us is.



Saint Peter Julian Eymard (1811-1868)

Born in France, Pierre-Julien's deep love for Jesus in the Eucharist was revealed when as a little boy he left home and was found in the Church, standing on a high stool close to the Tabernacle. "I am here, listening to Jesus," he explained.

Peter Julian's first attempt to join the Seminary ended in serious illness. He tried again, and at age 23, was ordained a Diocesan priest. Despite persistent health issues, Eymard was an amazingly energetic and hardworking priest. Naturally drawn to contemplation, the demands of his ministry made it impossible for him to live a purely contemplative life. Eymard soon joined the Religious Congregation, the Society of Mary. Throughout his life, he had an intense devotion to Mary, the Mother of God. He enjoyed going on pilgrimage to various Marian Shrines throughout Europe.

It was Eymard's apostolic work for the Society of Mary that would put him in contact with his first love - Jesus in the Eucharist. Father Eymard was especially effective at preaching Eucharistic devotions. It was on one such occasion, on Corpus Christi, that he had a powerful experience that would change the course of his life. While carrying the Blessed Sacrament in procession he experienced an intense desire to "bring all the world to the knowledge and love of our Lord in the Eucharist." In 1856, he made the painful decision to leave the Marists in the hope of founding a Religious Congregation dedicated to the Eucharist.





The Congregation of the Blessed Sacrament, which Peter founded, alternated between an active apostolic life and contemplating Jesus in the Eucharist. They worked with children preparing them to receive their First Communion. They also reached out to non-practicing Catholics, inviting them to repent and begin receiving Communion again. Eymard also directed his ministry to the young workers, the "rag pickers," and others who made up a large segment of the labour force of Paris.

Eymard's understanding of the Eucharist was not limited merely to adoration and reparation but to reaching out to those who were estranged from Jesus and evangelizing them. Gradually there was a deepening of Eymard's Eucharistic devotion – from a spirit of reparation to a spirituality of loving surrender to Jesus Christ in the Eucharist. In 1858, together with Marguerite Guillot, Eymard founded the "Servants of the Blessed Sacrament", a Contemplative Congregation for Women.

Eymard has inspired people around the world to live a more dynamic and transformative Eucharistic life by uniting regular participation in the Mass, times of contemplation and prayer in the presence of the Blessed Sacrament, and service to others in Christ's name. Eymard was canonized by Pope John XXIII in 1962. John Paul II named Eymard "Apostle of the Eucharist". May our celebration of the Eucharist proclaim the liberating love of God and inspire us to generously offer our service to build up a world where there is justice and peace.

By His will, I'm still a living member of the human race.


At this stage, I know I could not get by on my own, But my family lovingly cares for me and I don't feel all alone.

On the 25th of July we had the joy of experiencing an enriching webinar hosted by the Jesus Club entitled the 'Colourful Shades of Parenting'. Each child has a colourful identity that is unique and parenting celebrates every hue they represent, no matter how great the challenge may be.

Dr Richard Pereira and Canice his wife, shed light on the various difficulties that were encountered by the model family Mary, Joseph and Jesus, drawing focus to how they dealt with each situation. Truly an example we can imbibe from at all times in our daily encounters as parents.

They stressed on the importance of prayer. Their family motto: Gaze upwards, look inward, reach outward and press forward, with the hope of a better tomorrow.

Their family survival tool kit for Covid times consisted of: The role of the Father and Mother; disciplining, setting priorities, being grateful, growing in holiness and focusing on building strong relationships through our responsibility of handing down the faith; by being a witness to God's Word.

Fr. Gerard then took us on a journey revising the promises made between ourselves and God. All soaked in the relevant eyeopeners that we can keep in mind especially when the going gets tough!

- 1. Children have been given to us to take care of, but they belong to God. We will be held accountable if we fail in our duty.
- 2. We must be obedient to the will of God.
- 3. Educate our children not just the act of sending them to school, but accepting children lovingly from God and bringing them up according to the laws of the church and in the practice of the faith.

The family is the anchor that provides faith to children. The faith (Jesus) is the greatest gift we can give our children. Prayer is not enough our children's relationship with our Lord should be built through the living examples of their parents, and the love they have for each other. The three most important places in the life of a child are: a. The Home b. The School of Values c. The Domestic church



Our final speaker was Dr. Wilona Annunciation - a consulting psychiatrist and a mental wellness coach. She deftly tackled challenges faced by parents through her own family experiences and stressed on the need to focus on building the relationship between parents and children:

- 1. Helping our children to adjust and manage change. Embrace 'change' and support your child while keeping values intact.
- 2. She stressed on the need to be prepared for the influence of friends on our children.

The camaraderie between children and their friends will always be there, but we as parents need to dwell on developing and enhancing a growing relationship with our children that needs to adapt and accommodate changes with passage of time

- 3. Social media de-addiction restricted access to gadgets and electronics. A much needed touch point had many cobwebs of doubt cleared.
- 4. Discipline We as parents must be friendly with our children (plan fun activities) But we cannot be their Friends... we are their Parents and need to correct and guide them.

The webinar was anchored with inimitable expertise by our very own teacher, Bunny Cardoz. A touching 'Thank You' music video dedicated to our parents and grandparents showcasing emotive family pictures of our Jesus Club children and their families paved the way for a warm conclusion by Fr Baptista who expressed his thanks on behalf of the Jesus Club teachers, students and parents, to our dedicated speakers for their valuable contributions in guiding parents through the various challenges faced in today's world.



A highly impressed St. Peter returns to the pearly gates after assuring ALL OF US @The Parish of a reserved place up there!!



The Life Of Fr. Stan Swamy SJ - Discernment In Process



Fr. Stan explained how he found thousands of young Adivasis being arrested for protesting the taking over of their land for commercial purposes and languishing in jail without trial as they were accused of terrorism. He spoke of the survey he and his Jesuit colleague did of these Adivasis and how he filed a Petition in the Jharkhand High Court, giving the evidence of his survey and asking for the release of these people. He pointed out that he could not leave them in the lurch and that he was ready to pay the price. This was Stan Swamy. But how did he reach this position?

In a video interview with Journalist Tapan Bose, Stan had explained how, when he was in charge of the boys of a Tribal Boarding in Chaibasa during his early Jesuit formation, he had observed the open exploitation of the adivasis and the feeling of helplessness his boys felt in the face of this. That was when he decided that God was calling him to make a difference in the lives of these people. After his academic term as Director of the Indian Social Institute Bangalore ended, his discernment led him to go to the grassroots in Jharkhand and to work for the implementation of the Constitutional provisions for Scheduled Tribes, which were largely observed in the breach. His institute Bagaicha, in Ranchi, did conscientisation work with the adivasis, empowering them to claim their rights. This is what brought him into direct conflict with the State and with the big commercial interests which were keen on exploiting the rich natural resources which belonged to the Adivasis. Fr. Stan spoke of not being at all involved in the Bhima Koregaon matter, of not even knowing many of the activists and lawyers who were arrested in the case and of being implicated simply because of his justice work in Jharkhand.

The price one pays for objecting to the exploitation of disadvantaged people in our country can be seen not only in the

incarceration of Fr. Stan but also in the neglect and even abuse he faced in Taloja from the jail authorities. The Sipper incident has been widely reported but what is more significant is the almost non-existence of medical facilities in the "Jail Hospital" which Fr. Stan declared as "a misnomer, because all that was given there for any ailment was Paracetamol". And after 8 months, in May 2021, when Fr. Stan actually fell ill with symptoms that could have indicated Covid19, he was not administered the RT-PCR test, even when he was sent twice to the Government-run J.J. Hospital. How professional medical personnel can justify to their consciences, the sending of an under-trial back to Taloja without taking such a test, is indicative of severe pressure. And giving Fr. Stan the first dose of the vaccine in jail, even though he was very unwell, is also medically inexplicable. But though Fr. Stan withstood all this, it took a toll on his health and his strength. On arrival in Holy Family Hospital after the High Court ordered this, Fr. Stan was put straight into the Covid ICCU, because all indications, including a C.T. Scan, showed symptoms of Covid and these were confirmed the next day by the RT-PCR test. With his lungs affected and his Parkinson's progressed from neglect (he had difficulty even in swallowing), Fr. Stan's 84-year old heart was not able to withstand the strain and while he himself was looking forward to medical bail that was likely in such a situation, Fr. Stan succumbed in hospital.

Did Ignatian discernment play a part in Fr. Stan giving such courageous witness to his commitment to justice? He remained a Jesuit through and through, he valued prayer and Holy Communion and he was still looking to contribute to the lives of others. Ignatian Spirituality was evident in his readiness to pay the price for what God had called him to do.

Adding The Newest "R" To Save The Environment... Refill

Many of our everyday household items are available in "Single-Use" packaging which we promptly dispose into the garbage without a second thought. In reality only a small amount of this waste is recovered and recycled while a major portion ultimately reaches the landfill, leaches into water bodies causing catastrophic effects on the environment in the long run.



The "Refill" concept was touched upon in the Keystone February 2021. A mini survey was conducted at the time which revealed that a number of the FMCG majors in India like Hindustan Unilever Ltd (HUL), Proctor & Gamble(P&G), Godrej Ltd were marketing a number of their detergents in large refill packs to reduce packaging and shared their cost saving to their customers through discounted prices.

We had noted that the UK counterparts of Unilever and Proctor & Gamble had introduced their customers to the concept of Refill Stations for a range of products from cleaning agents to cosmetics and tea powder in October 2020 targeting to make 100% packaging material, reusable or recyclable by 2030. Recently TerraCycle USA has joined hands with brands like Coca Cola, Heinz, Unilever, Nivea and Danone introducing customers to "Zero Waste Shopping" across 20 countries worldwide.











In India, HUL targeted to make their packaging material 100% recyclable, reusable or compostable by 2025. This was an exciting moment for us environmentalists. Coincidently in February at the time of publication of our previous article concrete steps were taken and a pilot refill station was installed at Reliance Smart in Acme Mall, Santacruz West but was not operational due to the second wave of the Covid pandemic. This June the project has started and a comparative Refill Station price list for products available is below.

We appeal to everyone to use this facility to promote the "Refill" concept which will encourage other companies to adopt the same environmentally friendly practices. To take this forward we would appreciate anyone who has contacts in companies like HUL, P&G, Godrej etc. to share them with us so we may can as a community contribute significantly to this cause.

- **vi)** We engage in **common action through ALMs** or other structures for bettering the lives of people in the locality through cooperation. We work towards having a common platform to discuss issues of the local community in Bandra.
- vii) We are people who dialogue much (especially in conflict situations) and make efforts to build friendships with all.
- viii) We involve in **public policy making** and join in **campaigns for justice**.

Suggestions will be sought from all the Communities and thereafter an Action plan will be finalised to work at our Parish Theme for the year.
