

# In What Direction Will The Spirit Blow?

As you receive this newsletter, Fr. Luke Rodrigues S.J., who will soon take over as Parish Priest, will have reached the home town of St. Ignatius - Loyola, Spain, elected by the 180 Jesuits of the Bombay Province, to represent us at a meeting where 100 Jesuits from all over the world will discern where the Spirit of Jesus is leading the Jesuits in the years ahead.


Our Superior General, Fr. Arturo Sosa says, "This meeting is a unique opportunity to listen to the Spirit. Our common home is threatened as never before; poverty is on the increase and people feel increasingly alienated and marginalised; men and women are hungry for the life-giving Spirit; the young long for a hope-filled future. We hear a call to enter into a space of vulnerability, to admit that we do not know where we are being led, to let go of our own plans and dreams and, instead, let God dream in us".

St. Peter's in the last several years has also been trying to discern what the Spirit of Jesus is saying to us in the Parish. And we believe God's Spirit has led us to deepen Ignatian spirituality; to include in our worship Catholics with other linguistic preferences; to give a voice to lay people through short monthly sharings at the Sunday Masses; to reach out to those in need; to build bridges of understanding and concern with people of other faiths; to take seriously our concern for creation by urgent action and attitudinal change; and to indicate to our young people in the Parish that they are important to us and that we would like to encourage their full participation in the Parish.

And what wonderful initiatives have emerged! Our young people have surprised us with repeated programs for the Parish through "Unwrap", para-liturgical services like the enacted Stations of the Cross and sessions for Senior Citizens. Our Multi-Faith Committee has conducted, under the guidance of Fr. Aubrey, cultural programs like the Easter-Eid Milan, the Dandiya dances, the pilgrimage to other religious shrines and other events of significance for understanding that we are all sisters and brothers. The Care for Creation group, inspired by Fr. Gerard, has taken up many initiatives to push us to reduce our use of resources, reuse what is possible and recycle the rest. Our Collection of segregated dry waste at our entrance, the Bio-Composting plant at the Earth Corner Exhibition, our Commitment to Shroud Burial and the Refillable Movement to reduce single-use plastic, are but symbols of the Environmental Movement begun. The "Food for the Hungry" project, with a hot meal to about 80 people every weekday, which is in its 6th year, funded generously by Parishioners and others, is a contribution to giving the basics to people in need.

The Spirit will continue with Her Surprises! May we be open and respond with enthusiasm and commitment.

Saint Philip Neri (1515-1595)

Feast 26<sup>th</sup> MAY

Philip Neri was a Christian Mystic and Evangelist, Founder of the Congregation of the Oratory, a dynamic Community of Catholic Priests and Brothers. Born in Florence, the boy Philip was known for being cheerful and devout. At 18-years old, Philip encountered Jesus Christ - a life-transforming experience. He abandoned a good opportunity to amass wealth and moved to Rome - inspired by the Holy Spirit to radically live for and to serve the Lord Jesus and His Church—not as a Priest, but as a Lay person.

In Rome, Philip lived an ascetical and prayerful life, while actively engaged in reforming Christian Life and in caring for poor people. Philip easily caught people's attention with his warm personality and incredible sense of humour. His conversations led his listeners to consider a new and better way of life, the Christian Way. He encouraged groups of people to gather for discussions, studies, prayer and the enjoyment of good music. Losing no time in converting good conversation to good action, Philip would lead his followers to Hospitals to provide nursing care to the sick or to the Church to pray to and encounter Jesus Christ.

In 1544, on the eve of Pentecost, Philip experienced a globe of fire entering his mouth, filling his heart with Divine Love and moving him to radiate God's love to others. On the advice of his Confessor, Philip was ordained a priest and soon became an outstanding Confessor himself, gifted with the charism of recognizing the unexpressed sins of his Penitents while encouraging them to dedicate themselves totally to Jesus Christ.

Philip's appealing nature and deep spirituality won him many followers. Some became Priests and lived in Community. The Congregation of the Oratory was founded with members who sincerely lived their Faith and joyfully proclaimed the Good News of Jesus to all peoples, in words and in deeds. Oratorians committed themselves to Community life without any vows to bind them to Monastic life.

With his characteristic virtues of humility and cheerfulness, Philip worked on converting influential persons within the Church to further the Counter-Reformation Movement, by themselves living a life of personal holiness. Philip associated himself with all kinds of people, engaging them in prayer and involving them in the social ministry. He was "all things to all persons' inspiring everyone to a life of sanctity.

After spending a whole day hearing Confessions and receiving visitors, Philip Neri suffered a hemorrhage and died on the feast of Corpus Christi at the age of 80. He was beatified and canonized almost immediately after his death due to numerous miracles worked through his intercession.

Philip combined in himself an attractive and jovial personality with an intense holiness of Life. To those striving to become saints, Philip advised that they first become better human beings - to become like Jesus, fully human, fully divine.




**Holy Family Core Group**


A sign over a door read "Teacher Please May I Go." We all did.

## Swachh Bandra - The Trail Of Events

In the March Keystone we had described CCG's efforts to clear the garbage dump on St Peter's Road.

We would like to share the actual trail of events from late November 2022. The Junior officer of the Solid Waste Management (SWM) Department had chartered a plan with CCG for the removal of the garbage dumped on St Peter's Road. He suggested that the wall at the garbage site be painted; CCTV installed to catch and fine dumpers; an education drive would be carried out by the Licence Dept of BMC while the garbage collection would be stepped up by him at this location. We were happy to see quick results as the garbage collection had been stepped up to clear the road.





Just before Christmas 2022, three residents of Bandra living on roads away from St Peter's Road had a meeting with the same BMC Jr Officer at the garbage site. These 3 residents of Bandra insisted that the BMC Officer keep the 6 bins they had procured on St Peter's road. They chained the bins and left the key at Chandrashekhar Pan Shop so that the BMC staff could unlock for emptying purposes. Chaining the bins gave them permanence.

What does the law say? Placing bins on the road is contrary to BMC policy which mandates that every citizen must hand over segregated waste to the BMC van or the SMPA staff deployed to collect waste in slums and Gaothan where the BMC vans cannot reach. The placement of bins on the road was a setback to the plan made by the officer himself. To date no one can fathom why this officer would have a meeting with another set of residents of Bandra when he was already coordinating with the Care for Creation team and with Fr Frazer himself whose institutions are the main properties on this road.

This led to another meeting with the BMC Jr Officer. He told us the placement of bins is temporary and they would be removed post Christmas. Nothing happened. We waited patiently and even after New Year the bins were still there in a row. Post New Year the BMC Officer went on leave and nothing could move forward.

We refused to be discouraged by the happenings and in February our team went house to house, shop to shop and hawker to hawker informing each one about the clean-up drive on St Peter's Road. Mind you the education drive had to be carried out by H West Ward but even after several reminders the Jr Officer refused to coordinate the drive. When we met the residents, hawkers and shop keepers of the adjoining roads and St Peter's road, we urged them to co-operate with the BMC collection or throw their waste in the community bins at the fish market. We also informed them when the CCTV was installed the bins would be removed and those dumping would be fined as this was promised at yet another meeting with this BMC Jr Officer. Some of the hawkers and shop keepers told us that someone had come around earlier (we assume one of the 3 residents who put the bins on St. Peter's road) and informed them to throw their waste into the bins but not outside the bins. They however appreciated that another attempt was being made to keep the road garbage free.

Towards the end of February the wall painting commenced. The BMC artist did a fantastic job of replicating our idea on the wall and in March the vibrant colours caught many an eye, but sadly the garbage bins remained against the wall much to our disappointment. The BMC Jr Officer now claimed a new strategy. He informed us that the bins will be removed in a phase wise manner and when he thinks appropriate! We find this illogical as people will dump garbage even if there is just one bin. In fact the hawkers and shop keepers are now asking us why the bins are still there after CCTV installation. Was it fair for this officer to ask us to incur the expense for CCTV when he had no intent to use the footage to fine dumpers.

The Jr Officer also mentioned that BMC could not remove the bins until they provide a regular service. We are wondering if the garbage collection service is required on St Peter's Road where no one resides or on adjoining Bazar road, Waroda road and Chapel road!



In this narrative you will see that the Care for Creation team is determined to clear the dump and educate the locals but the authorities don't share the same vision nor do the 3 residents of Bandra who have caused the problem. The only residential building on St Peter's Road is Baba Nagar and their collection of waste is at Hill Road. They also have garbage bins placed at the compounds exit so they have no need to walk all the way to this dump to dispose their waste. The other end of St Peter's road has eateries and the pork shop who are paying BMC Rs. 1500/- per month to collect their waste at night. Considering they are being charged for the regular "free service" it's more unlikely that they would dump their waste on the road.

The residents of the roads adjoining St. Peter's Road have a "not in my backyard attitude". They find it easier to dump on St Peter's road as no one resides there. Is it hygienic and safe to dump garbage in front of a school? Why are the residents of these 3 roads unashamed that the footage of them is being viewed 24 x 7 at the Parish Office. For those who drive by in their posh vehicles and sling bags of waste from their windows you too are being monitored by CCTV.

We strongly appeal to each one of you reading this appeal to please not use the garbage bins on St Peter's Road so that we can dispense with them and have the road garbage free for our children. We need to take charge of our surroundings. Let's collectively keep St. Peter's road clean.

At the outset, the Council thanked Fr. Frazer for his work for the Parish in his seven-year tenure and congratulated him on the milestone of 38 years of Priesthood on 20th April.

### Review

#### 1. Holy Week Services:

- Switching the Palm Sunday procession from 8.30 am to 7.30 am next year was recommended, to avoid the hot sun.
- It was pointed out that the 11 am mass on Maundy Thursday was very crowded although it is specifically meant for the sick and housebound and those accompanying them. It should be made clear next year, that others should not attend this Service as a matter of convenience.
- The humility and service in Jesus' washing the Apostles' feet was reflected in the Parish representatives on the altar washing one another's feet and the congregation respectfully bowing to each other or touching the others' feet
- A few chairs should be put for senior citizens who attend the Passo Service.
- At all 3 Triduum Services, the Choirs sang well; Lectors read distinctly; Homilies were meaningful and inspiring.
- **2.** Community Coordinator elections: Ten Communities have so far held their zonal Mass at which the new Coordinator was elected. In the event of any Community not having anyone standing for the elections, the Parish priest, as per the directive of the Archdiocese, will nominate a Coordinator.

#### 3. SHC Rally on May 01:

- Flyer giving details will be WhatsApped to all Parishioners requesting their attendance with their colleagues of other faiths. Others who are regular at our Church are also welcome. Members of the Multi-Faith Committee will be the Guests of Honour
- Five groups of zones combined, the Youth and the Jesus club have prepared banners on their chosen theme and will lead their Communities in the march past. This will be followed by each unit presenting their theme through skits/song/dance.
- There will be a half hour break for snacks and refreshment.
- Teams have been assigned for overall arrangements at the venue.
- **4. Updating the Website:** This is being regularly updated. Council Members are requested to look it up and inform the Parish office if any edits/updating is required for their respective Community.

#### 5. Information requested by BCS:

- **a. ALM survey:** Coordinators were given forms to provide ALM details in their Zone and submit the same duly filled to the Parish office.
- **b. Directory of Services & Businesses**: Co-ordinators are in the process of collecting details of businesses and services run by Parishioners to be incorporated in the BCS directory.

Frazer mentioned that if the use of the Villa is not financially viable, then other uses may have to be considered by the Jesuits.
