

The Feast of St. Ignatius offers us, among many other things, the opportunity to gustily belt out the old Ignatian March, ending with that fervent cry "Ignatius lead us on, till we die!!"

Well might we ask ourselves what we mean by this. What is the precise manner in which we seek to be led forward by Ignatius?

From among the many precious insights Ignatius has given us, let us focus on the sentence that he said to his early companions when sending them out on mission – Go and set the world on fire (Ite, Inflammante Omnia).


As a symbol, fire can have many meanings. In a negative sense, we can see fire as an agent of destruction. There is enough of this fire already present in the world. We see the destructive effects of global warming as forest fires sweep through large swathes of land. We witness the fires of rage and hatred as rampaging mobs torch houses. We hear the fiery words of demagogues who incite their followers to commit random acts of violence.

In this situation, we look to Ignatius and seek positive interpretations for the fire he wants us to spread.

Ignatius himself was a man on fire, a person filled with passion for doing great things. Whether it be before or after his conversion, there were no half measures with him. He asks us to have that same fire within us – a passion to do everything with excellence, doing everything with 'a generous spirit aflame with God.'


For him, God was the source of this positive fire. It is through our connection with the Lord that we can be on fire ourselves, pouring out our last ounce of energy for a noble cause. God is then the 'fire that kindles other fires'. Noble Knight, teach us by your example how to allow the fire of God's love to take over our lives, enabling us to become sparks of that same fire.

ASSUMPTION OF MARY

Mary is the first human being, who with her whole self, victoriously crossed the Finish Line into Heaven. As Mary is assumed into heaven, she takes each of us, her sons and daughters, by the hand and invites us to rejoice in the glory of her Assumption by following her Son in imitation of her own faithful, hopeful and radical example. Mary shows us that Heaven is within reach of all human beings, if we too, like her, do not give in to sin, if we praise God in humility, if we serve others generously. Looking at Mary assumed into the glory of heaven, we understand that true Power is revealed in humble service, that Glory arises from a loving heart.

The Assumption of Mary is one of the four Marian dogmas of the Catholic Church - defined by Pope Pius XII on 1st November 1950 as follows: "We proclaim and define it to be a Dogma revealed by God that the Immaculate Mother of God, Mary ever Virgin, when the course of her earthly life was finished, was taken up body and soul into the glory of heaven." The imagery of "taking up" is prevalent in the Latin Church while the Eastern Orthodox Church celebrates the "Falling asleep of the Mother of God." Eastern Christians believe that Mary died a natural death, that her soul was received by Christ upon death, that her body was resurrected after her death and that she was taken up bodily into heaven in anticipation of the general resurrection.

We pray that Mary may accompany us on our journey that leads from our earthly life to eternal Life in Heaven. May she inspire us to follow her in a life of lowliness of spirit and humility in service – the secret of Mary's success in attaining our goal, in reaching Heaven. May our soul ever proclaim the greatness of the Lord, may our spirit rejoice in God, our Saviour, for He looks with favour upon us, His lowly servants. May we experience with Mary that the Almighty does great things for us. In gratitude, we exclaim: Holy is His Name.



CATECHIST RECOLLECTION ON "DESIDERIO DESIDARAVI"

On 23rd July 2023, 60 enthusiastic catechists from the Bandra Deanery, gathered at the hall at 'Daughters of St. Paul', for their first 'Catechist Recollection'

Bernadette, the deanery coordinator, welcomed the catechists & introduced the speaker Fr. Henry Dsouza, SVD, Parish priest of St. Theresa's church, Bandra. The topic chosen by the Archdiocese was "Desiderio Desidaravi; " meaning "Liturgical formation of the people of God."

Fr. Henry began with a short prayer and told us that Pope Francis had released this encyclical 'Desiderio Desidaravi' on 29th June,2022, the feast of Saints Peter & Paul. This encyclical is based on Luke 22:15, when Jesus tells his disciples, "I have earnestly desired (desiderio desideravi) to eat this Passover with you before I suffer."

Father mentioned that not only the apostles but all of us are invited to the Last Supper that is "mass". He asked what were some of the problems at mass? Some catechists answered that there is no reverence for the Eucharist, people come in late, have a casual approach. Others said that people insist on receiving communion on the tongue & appreciate short homilies. Father also agreed that certain priests finish mass too soon.

Father summarised the 5 parts of the mass, namely the penitential rite, liturgy of the word, liturgy of the Eucharist, Communion rite & concluding rite. Novenas, devotions to saints are not part of liturgy. Throughout the interactive session, Father spoke on the liturgy, Divine office, vestments, Sacramentals, types of oils, liturgical seasons & symbols used.

Father explained the difference in uses of the altar & pulpit during the mass. Also, prayers of the faithful should be recited from the lectern & not from the choir, he said.


It is in the power of the Paschal mystery, through the Eucharist & sacraments that we encounter the Lord Jesus in a special way.

- 1. The main focus in our liturgies, should be on Christ who is the most important person in the Eucharist
- 2. We ought to rekindle the liturgical wonder for the Eucharist so as to not get too familiar with the Mass.
- 3. Cultivate the sense and significance of symbols in the Liturgy & celebrate the Eucharist with reverence.



FRIENDS OF MANIPUR MEET



We have all been shocked and distressed by the violent incidents that have occurred in Manipur over the last 3 months. So, when a call for action was given by the "Friends of Manipur" the people of Mumbai responded by attending in large numbers, to show solidarity, understand what was going on and to discuss what we, here could do to help alleviate the situation. The meeting was held in St. Joseph's School Hall which was packed to capacity with people spilling out into the courtyard.

Bishop Allwyn D'Silva presided over the meeting and had requested the Sabha to get involved. The speakers included Advocate Mihir Desai, Teesta Setalvad, well known for her role in the Godhra case, Irfan Engineer, Rupa Chinai who is a journalist and author who has spent much time in the north East and Dolphy D'Souza, President of the BCS and one of the organizers. All the speakers were knowledgeable and articulate, throwing light on the situation, each from their special area of expertise.

While the government sought to portray this as a fight between 2 tribes, we were asked to reflect on the fact that over 240 churches were burnt and destroyed, that too, belonging to both tribes. We were

reminded that injustice anywhere was a threat to Justice everywhere.




PARISH PASTORAL COUNCIL HAPPENINGS - Fr. Luke Rodrigues s.j.

The PPC meeting of 14 July 2023 was our first meeting after the constitution of the new Parish Council.
