


To help us to be fully immersed in His pain and suffering, there are a series of 14 most poignant visuals.

Tradition holds that Mother Mary set up stone markers at her home outside Jerusalem to prayerfully retrace the steps of her Son's passion.














These Stations of the Cross are prints of paintings by an Italian painter C. SECCHI (1876 - 1950)


It is heartening to witness the Stations of the Cross being conducted by our various zonal communities.

An iconic convent in the heart of Bandra

If you were born and brought up in Bandra, chances are that your grandmothers, mothers, and aunts would have all passed through the portals of our St. Joseph's Convent - the red bricked building, set in a beautiful garden diagonally across from St. Peter's Church.

What do we know about the Congregation of the Daughters of the Cross who run St. Joseph's Convent?

The Congregation of the Daughters of the Cross (fille de la croix) was founded in 1833 in Liege (Belgium) by Mother Marie Therese. In 1862, they came to India via Karachi, which was then a part of India. They were the second religious Congregation that established themselves in the Archdiocese of Bombay, and they worked in the Bombay Province, the Calcutta province and the Orissa province. Their charism is service to those around with a preferential love for the poor.






In our parish, the Sisters are affectionately called the "St. Joseph's nuns"

They make their presence felt in the field of education. They have also helped in the care of orphans, day scholars and have reached out to the under privileged as well. Every community in our parish has a religious Sister guiding them. They are a part of our choirs, lectors and youth groups.

19th March is the feast of St. Joseph. Why have our nuns chosen St. Joseph as their patron saint?

The Daughters of the Cross believe St. Joseph to be their protector. In Liege, there is a large statue of St. Joseph erected on a hill and he is entrusted with the task of guarding their property.

Down the years, the tribals in the Ashagad area had been divested of their ancestral lands. They had been exploited by money lenders and were driven deep into the hills and forests which had become their only haven of security. Hemmed in on all sides by oppressive forces, theirs seemed to be a condition of sheer hopelessness.

This was the situation when, in 1967, Fr. Stanny Miranda started a Mission station here. A small church, Our Lady of the Forsaken, was built. Hectic efforts were made to solve the numerous problems faced by the tribals. Training in agriculture, animal husbandry, horticulture, poultry was organized to help them become self reliant. Self help saving groups were formed. Legal education programes were started to help them fight for their rights.

But their liberation would remain an uphill task unless they were educated. And so in 1992, the first primary school was set up. Balwadis were started in villages situated too far from the schools. Loyola Ashram School (started by Fr. Adrian D'Cruz) was opened in 1996.





Last month a few of us parishioners visited this Ashagad Mission Station which is "twinned" with our parish. Frs. Sanjeev Gonsalves, Tony Toscano, Joe Pithekar and Anaclete Fernandes patiently took us around and answered our many questions.





A warm welcome with a traditional aarti awaited us at the Loyola Ashram School









We interacted with the dedicated staff and bright-eyed, curious students.

Learnt that government funding has been obtained for "ashram shalas" (boarding schools)





The study hall doubles up as sleeping quarters for the boarders, with the students' belongings neatly stacked on shelves.



Mass was celebrated for us in a vast hall that serves as a chapel. Masses are held here weekly or fortnightly.

Left the Mission station with our minds in a whirl. Marveled at the zeal, courage and foresight of the Fathers who had dared to venture into the "wild" and start the Mission station. We had met the staff, some of whom had studied in the school, had gone out to the "big city" to further educate themselves and then had come back to contribute to the Adivasi society.

Had seen the fruits of education multiply!

Glad that we at St. Peter's are doing our bit to help out. But the feeling persisted and grew...what MORE can WE do? "Giving is not just about making a donation.

It is about making a difference."

Around the 1980s, Dr. Lawrence D'Souza offered General Medicine to all, especially to the members of the St. Vincent de Paul of our parish. He then brought in Dr. Bosco Pereira.

Today a vibrant team of volunteers (lead by Ms. Maggie Mascarenhas) and physicians, homeopaths, physiotherapists, a skin specialist...all pass on the spirit of obtaining a sound and healthy body, mind and soul to all.

Traditional Practises in Lent

at St. Peter's Church (inputs from Bunny Cardoz and Paul Fishery)

In the liturgical calendar, we have commenced the holy season of Lent.

This 40 day period is "lent" to us to prepare for the resurrection of our Lord. We are encouraged to focus on inner reflection, repentance, fasting and abstinence. We take a deep dive into spiritual cleansing and healing

Here at St. Peter's, our Confraternity have been practising some interesting and age old traditions.

A few snippets...

This programme begins on the first Sunday in Lent and continues till Palm Sunday. A theme is chosen for each Sunday and a homily (in English and Marathi) is preached on the theme. A rosary is prayed and the evening ends with a benediction.

The Passo

After the Good Friday service,
there's the traditional Passo taking down from the cross. This is
followed by the statue of Mother
Mary being carried on to the
grounds on a palanquin and kept
near the bier of Jesus. Nowadays
this is accompanied by a fantastic
sound and light show which adds to
the pathos of the tableau.

During Lent, at midnight, the Papiyas or the hooded mourners (the hooded capes are called Ope) walk to various crosses in the neighborhood reciting prayers from a book called the 'Puran". These are prayers of repentance and forgiveness said in the local Marathi dialect. At each cross they reflect on the 14 stations and sing the dirges.

The Last Supper Tapleau

On Holy Thursday, a tableau of the Last Supper is set up, the priest blesses the bread and fruit on the table and this is then sold to the gathered faithful. For children, it is an awesome experience seeing life-sized statues of Jesus and the apostles.



Venonica Service

After the evening mass on Palm Sunday, the Veronica service is conducted. The statues of Christ and Mother Mary on palanquins are carried on to the church grounds. A young girl (Veronica) makes her way through the crowd, wipes the face of the statue of Jesus and then sings a hymn in Latin. This is followed by a homily in Marathi about the courage of Veronica and facing challenges in today's world.

In addition, the Friday 'Way of the Cross' is conducted by various cells/groups of the parish.

Our Annual Pilgrimage to the Mount will be on Friday, 8th March. We leave from St. Peter's Square at 7:45 am for Mass at the Mount at 8:30 am.

The Redemptorist Fathers will preach a Lenten Mission in our Parish. They will visit families from 10 - 16 March, and the Preaching will be in the evenings from 17 - 23 March.
