Here are interesting facts about each of these Saints

ST PETER

St Peter's name was originally Simon and he was a fisherman of Galilee.

He was one of the twelve apostles. His brother, Andrew, introduced him to Jesus.

St. Peter struggled with doubt and human weakness, yet Jesus still chose him!

St. Peter was the first Pope. The Catholic Church can trace the succession of every pope back to St. Peter!

The Acts of the Apostles illustrate his role as the Church's head - the rock upon which Christ would build his Church

He died by crucifixion. Tradition says he requested an upside-down crucifixion because he considered himself unworthy to die the way Jesus did.

ST PAUL

Before receiving the name Paul, he was Saul, a Jewish pharisee who zealously persecuted Christians in Jerusalem.

He underwent a huge conversion on his way to persecute Christians in Damascus. He instead went on to be baptized there and dedicated his life to spread the Gospel.


He was imprisoned and beheaded under Emperor Nero.


His letters are in the New Testament. These writings shed light on the faith of the early Church.

He is buried in Rome in the Basilica of St Paul Outside the Walls.


St. Paul is the patron and saint of the missionaries and evangelists!





What do we offer these children?

We follow a prescribed syllabus from the Archdiocese of Mumbai, and also teach the children prayers and bible stories suitable for their age.

Besides this, they learn how to participate fully in the Eucharistic celebration, where they read, sing and serve at the altar of the Lord. Std 3 learns the 10 commandments and the Beatitudes in song and pictures. In Std 4 they are prepared for the Sacrament of the Holy Eucharist.

Kids have fun acting, singing, playing, and debating and they are encouraged to use their talents in the service of the Lord. They learn to mix with all types of children and often form friendships that last forever. This builds up their confidence and inter personal skills. Outreach programmes and picnics are fun times and yet they have a message. Modern technology is used to make lessons fun, interactive and interesting. Colouring sheets, quizzes, word searches and crosswords add to the informal atmosphere.

We are aware that today, a lot of children do not attend Catholic schools and hence there is no religion taught to them. This makes it even more necessary for children to learn more about the faith from the Jesus Club

Our aim is to nourish the seed of faith planted at baptism and help the child grow into a mature adult. Come, let us help your children grow.



A case for Reverse re-development - Maharashtra Nature Park

Care for Creation Group with Natasha DCosta organized a visit to Maharashtra Nature Park (MNP) in Mahim East. Braving the ferocious Friday sun on May 24th, members of the Care for Creation group and other parishioners headed to Mahim East all capped and booted.

MNP is the brainchild of Shanta Chatterji, a corporate lawyer, who worked under the guidance of Dr. Salim Ali (Birdman of India). The aim was to have a green lung in Mumbai and also to generate awareness about Nature Conservation. Its natural settings and rich biodiversity makes it an ideal place for this purpose. However it was not always so green.

Developed on a garbage dumping ground of 37 acres, the park is a wonderful example of how a wasteland can be "redeveloped" in the ecological sense. It has vast expanses of manmade forest and is surrounded by the natural ecosystem of the mangrove forests of the Mithi River. It is home to 14000 varieties of trees such as Hirada, Behada, Amala, Arujn, Kadunimb, Baniyan, Fig etc. There are 125 species of birds such as Indian Paradise Flycatcher, Kingfisher, Rose-ringed Parakeet, Purple-rumped Sunbird, Coppersmith Barbet and White Spotted Fantail Flycatcher.

85 species of butterflies can be found here too. Reptiles such as Russel's viper, Sand boa, Cobra besides most of the species of lizards and geckos are a part of the ecosystem.

A section of the forest is devoted to medicinal plants. The manmade lake in the center is home to the resident crocodile besides other amphibians. There is a nursery, from where our group shopped for as many plants as we could carry home.

We returned, tired and happy and ready to spread the message of reverse redevelopment, to enrich the spaces around us with the colours of nature.

We come with an expiry date...so does everything else, be it food, clothes, medicines, masalas, cosmetics - no matter how good or useful they were, once upon a time!!


Do a thorough check of all storage. Clean up - clear out The freedom and joy of "less" is worth experiencing. Try it. Take baby steps to declutter and minimalise.
