



We quote excerpts of an insightful article by the late Fr. Joe Maciel s.j., where we are reminded that, despite the passage of time, the essence of Lent remains unchanged.

In our modern age, filled with the stupendous achievements of man in so many spheres, it might seem strange that the church should dedicate a special season to penance.

We like to think that penance was alright for people of days gone by, for monks and hermits and old men and women who had lost their zest for living. The very words "penance" "mortification" seem to frighten us, to make us feel terribly out of place. And yet, the Church, shrewd and experienced judge of men that she is, insists in her liturgy and her pronouncements that if we are to be Christians worthy of the name, our daily lives have to be seasoned with, salted with penance.

Lent is a time for penance and a time for deep reflection. Lent, year after year, makes us see life in proper perspective, to look at the cross of Christ and face the searing fact of sin and it's effects on man.

Our lenten observance should serve to draw us closer to the Crucified. Love prompted God to send us a Redeemer, who died for our sins and rose triumphantly on the third day. Love - deep, sincere, emptied of all sentimentality - should prompt us to go about our Lenten observance cheerfully and willingly for "God loves the cheerful giver"



In Mumbai, the sweltering summer heat of May could blind us to the fact that this is actually a very pleasant time in Europe. This is the middle of the spring season, a time when the earth is sprouting with new life - trees and meadows are in full bloom, birds and butterflies abound, and people enjoy being outdoors in nature. In Ancient Greece and Rome, this month was dedicated to different goddesses of nature, celebrating the fertility of the earth.

When Christianity spread through Europe, this springing forth of new life reminded Christians of Mary who brought forth Jesus Christ, the author of all life. Mary was seen as a symbol of renewal, someone who brings a new impulse to the Church as a whole. This connection grew stronger over the years, and different devotions were organized on each day of the month.

The Archangel Raphael community visited the St. Anthony Home for the Aged. It was a touching and humbling experience to meet former parishioners.





Our parish Care for Creation Group visited Tara, Taval The star that shives in Raignd where nature based livelihood is being encouraged in the local communities.

Lillian Pais writes in "Tara is a 6 acre plot with a nature trail of natural vegetation consisting of fruit trees, medicinal plants and other vegetation specific to the area which may not be fruitful but help to fixate nitrogen and nourish the soil. The rustling and crunching, when we walked on the blanket of dry leaves, made us feel one with nature. A small portion is cultivated with herbs and medicinal plants and the caretaker Lakshmana, explained the use of these plants for various ailments."

Where is Tara?

What is the connection between the Bombay Jesuit Province and Tara?

Tara is in the Raigad district of Maharashtra. In 1986, the Archbishop of Mumbai,

Cardinal Simon Pimenta, invited the Jesuits to Raigad to cater to the pastoral needs
of the small group of Catholics working at the MIDC centre of Raigad with
their headquarters at Tara. Soon, other religious groups of men and women
of the diocese began actively working for the tribal population of Adivasis and Katkaris.

In 1990, the Jesuits acquired land in Tara and in 1992, built their residence with Fr. Desmond D'Monte as Superior and Fr. Frederick Sopena as Director of the Janhit Vikas Trust (JVT). The JVT worked for the all round development of the Katkaris.

Later, the Centre for Social Action (CSA) of the Archdiocese of Mumbai made their presence felt, training locals in church related activities. So, the Jesuit involvement in Raigad declined, though the JVT continued working on a smaller scale.

The Jesuit team at Tara today, has a new vision - to make it an important centre in Raigad, training young girls in tailoring skills, running literacy classes...

With the spirit of the Magis, JVT is determined to render valuable service to the people of Raigad.

St. Peter's Church, Bandra, is a core member of the Care for Creation Group of the Bandra Deanery. Parish teams form this large group and regularly meet to discuss and share environmental related topics. Recently, St.Anne's Church, Pali Hill, hosted the meeting, and herebelow, our CCG Member, Lillian Pais, reports.

Premila Martis talked about the assault by humans on Planet Earth that sadly affects the health and existence of all those who inhabit it. "Even in death", she said, "the waste generated at funerals is sent in truckloads from cemeteries to landfills that are a curse on the environment."

She presented the idea of a single-focus parish level Green Burial Pledge Campaign where parishioners submit a signed pledge opting for a shroud burial and an eco-friendly funeral; the pledge also mentions a favourite charity. There was a productive and interactive discussion on contrary practices being followed and how leaders in the parish could bring about an awareness and mindset change in their communities.

Busunt Easter Eggs


Ingredients:

300gms mixed biscuit. (broken)
100gms butter or cream
2 Eggs (beaten)
100gm sugar
250 gms of dark chocolate slab
Vanilla essence - 1tsp

Method:

Break the biscuits into small pieces for the cake and powder the biscuits for eggs. Melt the chocolate in a pan and when cool add the beaten egg, essence and butter. If dry add milk. Stir up the mixture and when cool, press into egg forms or mould by hand into oval shapes. Refrigerate and next day you can wrap in foil. You can also put the mix into a loaf tin and refrigerate and then cut slices and serve. You can add nuts or raisins to the mixture if you want to.


